- You will get a notification of acceptance by December 20th, 2024
- Submit a draft of a full paper by February 2nd, 2025

FAQ: Is it possible to present the same content at the PhD day and at the IEWT conference?

Yes. The Ph.D. day will not encompass presentations in the same format as the conference. At the seminar, you will only present a short overview of your work and then rather focus on the draft of your planned publication. While the conference allows you to, first and foremost, share your work and connect from different fields of industry and research, the aim of the PhD day is the refinement of your scientific paper. Attendance at the IEWT conference is not a prerequisite for the participation of the Ph.D. day. Please submit your contributions for the PhD Day and the conference separately via the IEWT homepage, even if they cover the same topic.

FAQ: What classifies as a "draft of a full paper" here?

- The paper is in the process of being finished soon but not in its final form yet.
- The paper has not yet been submitted for publication.
- The structure, content, and "storyline" of the paper are clear, which is indicated by section and subsection titles, as well as the formulation of the content in the form of clearly understandable bullet points or at least partly finalized text.
- The methodology is clearly described.
- Addressed research questions are formulated and the presented key results have been at least preliminary visualized.
